
### What's the Buzz at the Department of Human Services

### **Employee Spotlights**


### **Emily Gilpin, Help Center Coordinator**

### Pennsylvania Women Work

Pennsylvania Women Work empowers job seekers with the skills they need to achieve their career goals, walking right alongside them every step of the way. The concept for this organization started in the 1970s. during a time when divorce rates were on the side in the United States. Women needed to find employment to support themselves and their children, often for the first time. Laurie Shields, a 55-year-old widow, and Tish Sommers, a 57-year-old divorcee, found themselves struggling in their job search. They assembled the national coalition known as the Displaced Homemaker Network of 1979. When the national network disbanded, a dedicated group of Pennsylvanian women, headed by Mary Ann Eisenreich, founded Pennsylvania Women Work in 1993 and began offering the organization's flagship program, New Choices, across the state.

Over the last three decades, PA Women Work has grown and adapted to meet the changing needs of worm, refugees, and immigrants, individuals recovering from substance use disorder, and other minority populations, to provide relevant and cutting-edge programming to support each person's career goals. Since its founding, PA Women Work has helped over 72,000 individuals in career transition.

When someone joins the organization, they are surrounded by caring people here to help them create a career plan and achieve their goals to start, grow, or transition in their career. Through one-on-one career coaching, group workshops, mentorship, and career development resources, PA Women Work supports all job seekers with the skills they need to thrive in the workforce and achieve economic stability.

PA Women Work directly serves Southwestern
Pennsylvania with in-person career development
events and virtual programs and services throughout
the year. Whether it's a single mom, refugee or
immigrant, someone seeking career advancement, and
individual recovering from substance use disorder or
someone transitioning into a new career field, PA
Women Work serves people from all different
backgrounds. Everyone comes to our organization with
a different story and with their own unique goals, and
we are here to support them on their path to career
success.

# Pennsylvania Women Work (cont.)

In addition to PA Women Work's direct footprint, we partner with organizations across the state through our New Choices program, which provides career development and job search support.

All of PA Women Work's services are available at no cost to participants. Every person who starts with the organization is connected to a career coach for an introductory one on one meeting. During this discussion, career coaches listen to the job seekers to understand what barriers they are currently facing in their career.

### Sexual Assault Awareness Month

April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM).
