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





# Human Trafficking Awareness Month

April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month – a time to draw attention to the prevalence of sexual assault and educate individuals and communities about how to prevent it. Sexual harassment, abuse, and assault are widespread problems. In the United States alone, nearly one in five women and one in 67 men have been raped at some time in their lives (Smith et al., 2017), and one in four girls and one in twenty boys is sexually abused by the age of 17 (Finkelhor et al., 2014).

Sexual harassment, assault and abuse happen in all communities – including online spaces. The theme of this year's Sexual Assault Awareness Month campaign is "Drawing Connections: Prevention Demands Equity." The campaign calls on all individuals, communities, organizations, and institutions to change the systems surrounding us to build equity and respect within the community, workplace, and the future our youth hold.

Each of us has the power to enact change. We can all make a difference to ensure that the communities in which we engage are safe and respectful for everyone.

The STTARS Program offers free and confidential services to survivors of sexual violence and their families including counseling, legal and medical advocacy, and a 24-hour hotline. Prevention programming is also available to schools, professionals, and community groups on a variety of topics to address and prevent sexual abuse, harassment, assault, and trafficking. 
Washington County Children and Youth agency is committed to the wellbeing of children and families. By empowering and engaging families and the community, safety and permanency can be achieved and all members can thrive.


The agency has a Toolkit in place to ensure that we can empower our families and give them the very best opportunities to be successful and aid in preventing child abuse.

### Prescription Take Back Event April 22, 2023

The Washington Drug and Alcohol Commission will assist local police departments in the semi-annual National Prescription Drug Take Back Event scheduled for Saturday, April 22 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at locations throughout Washington County.

For more than a decade, WDAC has participated in the DEA's National Prescription Drug Take Back Days events by assisting local police departments at collection sites throughout the county. In doing so residents were able to rid their homes of unused and unwanted prescriptions and overthe-counter medications from their home medicine cabinets.

During the height of the opioid epidemic in 2016 WDAC Executive Director, Cheryl Andrews and then District Attorney, Gene Vittone formed the Washington County Opioid Coalition to combat the opioid crisis and to reduce overdose deaths in the county. The vision of the coalition is to eliminate opioid overdoses, reduce the stigma associated with opioid use disorder and ensure every patient with an opioid use disorder has access to and support throughout their treatment and recovery.

Coalition members agree that these take back events play an essential part reducing the risk for misuse of opioids and contribute to the vision of the coalition. During the October 2022 collection events, coalition members and local police departments collected 1,126 pounds of unused prescriptions and over-the-counter medications.
