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

Pete received a coin and proclamation from VA Secretary McDonough, congratulations from Congressman Reschenthaler's office, and a proclamation from the Washington County Commissioners.

### **David Painter, BHDS Chief Financial Officer**



Healing Bridges is a recovery-oriented nonprofit that guides and connects residents of Washington County and neighboring communities to comprehensive behavioral health and developmental health services. Since the organization was founded in 1968, Healing Bridges has helped individuals and families overcome hurdles and find solutions to their integrated care needs with diagnostic, therapeutic, rehabilitative, and developmental practices that improve overall wellness and quality of life. Today, Healing Bridges provides counseling/therapy, medication management, and mobile case management services to motivate positive self-growth journeys by connecting disadvantaged populations to the tools, skills, and resources necessary to live life to the fullest. We are currently accepting new intakes and referrals in all programs!



Any referring agency or individual inquiring about Outpatient Counseling/Therapy or Medication Management will be directed to our clinical intake coordinator to get initiated into our electronic health record system and scheduled for an in-person or telehealth clinical assessment. Any referring agency or individual inquiring about Mobile Case Management (Blended Case Management or IDD/A Supports Coordination services) should contact the Washington County Base Service Unit, Center for Community Resources, at 724-914-3058.

Currently with our outpatient programs, we have three on-site mental health therapists, two psychiatric nurse practitioners, one licensed practical nurse (LPN), one child board-certified psychiatrist and one adult board-certified psychiatrist/medical director on staff to help people of all ages find relief from mental health challenges. We are able to offer psychiatric evaluations, medication check-ins and pharmaceutical treatment plans for clients needing prescribed medications for psychological and emotional needs. We also offer a full-service pharmacy at our site location through Genoa, a Qol Healthcare Company.

In our mobile department, Healing Bridges currently has three blended case managers, nine supports coordinators, two supports coordination supervisors, and one supports coordination training specialist on staff to help our clients diagnosed with mental health disorders and intellectual and developmental disabilities/autism get connected to needed vocational, medical, financial, social, and educational services.

Our organization operates with a value-based care model, so all of our services are billed via insurance to keep rates affordable and accessible. To improve the agency's workflow and meet the high demand of underserved people needing behavioral and developmental health services, Healing Bridges plans on implementing an online intake form in the near future that will significantly improve overall patient and provider experience. We are open from 8:30am to 5:00pm Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. We are open until 7pm on Thursdays. # The Trevor Popeck Foundation, Inc.

The Trevor Popeck Foundation Inc. is a 501 (C) (3) nonprofit organization to help offset medical expenses. It was started in January of 2023 by Trevor Popeck, who is a recent graduate of Chartiers-Houston High School.

When Trevor was 3 years old, he went to preschool, and they conducted a vision screening. They noticed that his left eye seemed to have a few abnormal results; they suggested to his parents, Steve and Laurie Popeck, that they follow up with a pediatric ophthalmologist. So, his mom checked with their insurance and found a doctor nearby. Dr. Paviglianiti, MD, one of the doctors at Pediatric Ophthalmology, discovered the problem with Trevor's left eye. "I can still remember the conversation like it was yesterday," said Laurie. "Dr. Pav (that is what everyone calls Dr. Paviglianiti) conducted the eye exam and turned to me and said, "Well, Trevor has a juvenile cataract." It took me a minute, then I asked what that meant because I had only heard of cataracts happening to older people, not a three-year old. At this point, I just cried as I was trying to listen, but I was so overrun with emotion. I tried to think of anything and everything I did or didn't do during pregnancy that could have caused this. Dr. Pav could see I was upset, and he assured me it was something that happens to 25% of the population. While it wasn't uncommon, it would need to be removed, so Trevor did not lose his vision in that eye. I can remember asking him where the other parents were, as this was the first time I had ever heard of it... I honestly cannot remember what he said at that point. I just looked at Trevor, who was just staring at me because I was crying, and then think to myself, "Ok. I need to be strong here for him."

A few months later, surgery was scheduled at Children's Hospital in Pittsburgh. Trevor's parents went with him while his younger sister, Brooke, stayed with her grandparents. Dr. Pav conducted a successful 8-hour long surgery to remove the cataract, which felt like an eternity to Steve and Laurie in the waiting room. The recovery included patching his "good" eye to help get the connections strong in the left eye. This was a struggle at times because a toddler doesn't fully accept wearing a patch for a long time. Trevor eventually got glasses to help him with reading, as he is not allowed to wear contacts. The prescription is strong in the left eye, but completely clear in the right eye. Somehow, the days passed quickly into years, and it was time for Trevor to go to kindergarten. While many children with juvenile cataracts require IEPs, to receive large font accommodations, Trevor did not need one.

Trevor was successful in the classroom and in sports. He played baseball and basketball (while wearing prescription sport goggles). Eventually, he played football and wore a prescription face shield to protect his eyes but did not have to wear the sport goggles.

Fast forward to today, Trevor graduated high school in the top ten percent if his class and is soon moving to Cleveland to attend Case Western Reserve University and study engineering while also playing football. His family is beyond proud of him and the hard work he put into ensuring that The Trevor Popeck Foundation was successful.

To date, The Trevor Popeck Foundation has fundraised \$10,000 and their focus has now shifted to distributing funds as mini grants. The mission of the nonprofit is: A Foundation for Sight; A World of Possibility. The mini grants will help to offset medical expenses for children and adults that need financial assistance.

Trevor has seized the opportunity to inspire other. He personally wants to help other families feel like they are not alone. "I want other kids to know that if this happens to them that they can overcome it. Your future will still be bright, and this will just be part of the story you tell someday. Be strong and persevere through the trials."
