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

On Wednesday, November 20th, the Department of Human Services hosted the 1st annual Harvest for Hope Hunger and Homeless Awareness event. With the support of numerous community partners, meals were served to approximately 150 individuals in need. The event aimed to unite our community and raise awareness of the daily challenges faced by our neighbors – particularly hunger and homelessness. The Department of Human Services would like to extend a thank you to everyone who participated, volunteered and/or donated to make this event a success. On November 13th, Washington County Behavioral and Developmental Services, Intellectual Disabilities and Autism Program hosed the first Annual Employment fair for all individuals. There were many providers of employment that were set up and available to discuss their services and how they would be able to assist individuals who attended. The event also included various speakers from the WVU WIPA program, SAU1, ARC Human Services, and OVR, who gave presentations on topics of employment. Included with the ARC presentation was a panel of 4 individuals who presented and participated in discussion around employment. It was a very beneficial event and plans to be held again next year.

On Saturday, November 23rd, the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention and Pathfinders hosted International Survivors of Suicide Loss Day. The event focused on self-care and attendees were able to receive self-care kits to take home with them. Attendees were able to hear from a podcast style keynote speaker, complete a remembrance activity and receive a catered lunch from Angelo's. In addition, the unveiling of the Peace Crane curtain occurred which has become a symbol of peace, hope and healing. The curtain consists of 1000 origami cranes and will be a focal point for the 2025 Out of the Darkness Walk scheduled for September 27, 2025, at Washington Park Rotary Club Pavilion.

Michelle Gindlesperger, BHDS ID/A Program Specialist/ Intake


